Accent on Worship

"Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?" (Acts 10:47)

On the one hand, Peter's question in Acts is very practical. Aren't we going to accept these Gentiles into our group? Isn't the good news for everybody? Shouldn't everyone be baptized?

But on the other, this question is also beautifully metaphorical: Can anyone withhold the water? Of course not! That's the thing about water, isn't it? It's very hard to hold. Imagine trying to keep water in your cupped hands. Or trying to keep rain from falling on you. Or, to borrow an image we looked at this week in the Amos Bible Study, imagine trying to hold back the waters rolling down in an ever-flowing stream - it's impossible! The water will flow, try as you might to hold it back.

And that is Peter's point. We can't reign in the Holy Spirit, any more than we can hold back water. And if baptism is going to be our symbol for new life in the Spirit, a Spirit that is active and unstoppable and untameable, then we better let the water flow!

Peter's question also dovetails beautifully with the question we heard last week from the Ethiopian eunuch: "What is to prevent me from being baptized?" The eunuch's question addresses our own insecurities, our own apprehension that we can really be brought fully into the body of Christ, just as we are. And Peter's question challenges us to face the ways that we are still tempted to exclude, to shrink the love of God, and to claim ownership over it.

Together, these two questions reveal the many barriers we try to build around access to the divine, for ourselves and for each other, and how the Holy Spirit always floods right over them.

There are still deep divisions in the wider church about the sacrament of baptism - what exactly is happening during

baptism? Who is it for? Who should perform it? At what age should baptism be performed? Does it need to be done at all? And I, personally, have been having an ongoing theological crisis over baptism since starting seminary (and, I mean, if you don't have at least one theological crisis during seminary, I don't think you're doing it right...).

Having grown up in a tradition that practiced believer's baptism, the practice is strongly connected, for me, with the idea of repentance, with changing your mind and heart and path, and choosing Jesus, choosing life, instead. It's been difficult for me to embrace a Lutheran understanding of baptism, which is not as much connected to the ideas of choice and repentance, but which is beautifully symbolic of our own powerlessness, our own complete dependence on the grace and mercy of God. And what better picture for that is there than baptism in infancy? Before you are even aware of the grace - it is poured out upon you.

And as I struggle to hold both of these images, both treasured and beautiful in their own ways, Peter's question is weirdly comforting to me. Even as I try to wrangle my opposing theologies and all of my questions about this sacrament, the point is that the spirit is poured out already. Already renewing and growing and comforting and stirring. And, in the end, can anyone withhold the water?

Global Kid Connections



July 28: All-Church picnic at Minnehaha Park.


Align Minneapolis Lunch and Learn

Hunger in the Farm Bill – Take Action

From our partners at the ELCA: "Rep. Glenn Thompson (R-PA), chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture, announced intentions to introduce legislative text for reauthorizing the Farm Bill <u>as soon as April</u>. This comes after reports of <u>policy disagreements among lawmakers</u> on how to allocate antihunger, conservation and crop investment funding. Congress must pass or temporarily extend a Farm Bill by the end of September before certain programs start to expire.

Why It Matters in the ELCA:

Food programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) accompany the mission of our ministries, food pantries and charitable investments striving for a just world where all are fed. Cuts or newly added barriers to the SNAP program could come at a dire time as food costs continue to climb in many of our communities, and as many of our ministries are over capacity.

What's Next:

The ELCA Action Center has a current <u>Action Alert</u> urging lawmakers to preserve funding for SNAP and anti-hunger programs in the Farm Bill. ELCA Witness in Society staff will be meeting with congressional staff ahead of potential House introduction and will be monitoring the legislation."

Join outstanding professional vocal soloists and instrumentalists in preparing and rehearsing a cantata from chorus to chorale, then performing Bach's glorious music during Evening Prayer on Sunday.

Bach-Tage once again features conductor Kathy Saltzman Romey, this year leading orchestra and chorus in a study and performance of Bach's chorale cantata *Nimm von us, Herr, du treuer Gott*, built on the hymn tune *VATER UNSER*, and a setting of the Lord's Prayer by Heinrich Schütz.
